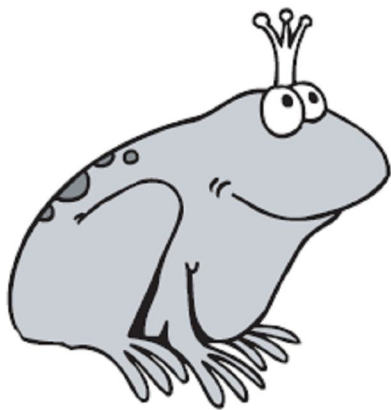


FROG PRINCE VOCABULARY
